July 31st

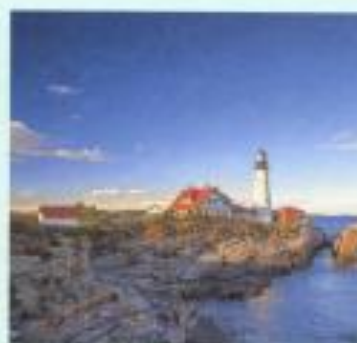
